


## COVID-19

## 2020 State & Local Government Report

Legislative, Executive, Regulatory, and Local Status as of March 28, 2020 at 2:30PM ET\*

Since the global outbreak of coronavirus, **over 80 bills** have been introduced **in 25 states**, **Puerto Rico**, **and the District of Columbia** on paid sick leave and worker protections as well as appropriations requests. **Over 340 executive actions** have been issued in **50 states**, **Puerto Rico**, **the District of Columbia**, **Guam**, **and the Virgin Islands**. These executive actions include but are not limited to school closures, prohibition of mass gatherings, retail and business closures, and declarations of states of emergency. A total of **20 task forces** have been established by **13 governors**. And, **25 states and the District of Columbia** have issued **emergency regulations** on a number of issues including but not limited to insurance carriers, labor and wage, and medical licensure. **Fifty-six (56) legislative chambers** have either temporarily adjourned, moved to virtual meetings, or announced an early recess or sine die. Additionally, we have included actions coming from the administrations of the 100 most-populated cities and counties beginning on page 47.
