Voters in Nevada will elect a Governor, Lt. Governor, and Attorney General this cycle. All 42 House seats will be on the ballot as well as half (11) the Senate seats. All races are expected to be competitive.

Attorney General

Democratic Nominee

Attorney General Aaron Ford (D) is running for re-election as Nevada's chief legal officer. Ford assumed the office in 2019 after defeating his republican opponent by a margin of 0.4 percent in the 2018 general election. Ford is a former member of the Nevada State Senate representing District 11 and spent time serving as Majority Leader, Minority Leader, and assistant majority whip throughout his tenure.

His campaign is [highlighting](#) his position on reproductive healthcare, claiming to be the only candidate that is defending reproductive freedom.

Other features of his campaign include his office's previous anti-trafficking efforts and the successful [legal battle](#) against opioid manufacturers that resulted in a \$330 million settlement.

More than a dozen Nevada Republicans have [crossed the aisle](#) to support Ford, forming the "Republicans for Ford" committee. Republicans cite lack of experience and temperament as reasoning for distancing themselves from Republican candidate Sigal Chattah (R).

As of June, Ford has outraised Chattah \$859,000 to \$83,000. Ford unveiled his own [NFT](#) that the public is able purchase as a form of funding for his campaign.

Trivia: Ford worked as a high school math teacher while pursuing his master's degree in international education.
