

ARKANSAS

Voters in Arkansas will elect a Governor, Lt. Governor, and Attorney General this cycle. All 100 House seats will be on the ballot as well as all half (18) of the Senate. Republicans are expected to maintain control of the Governor's Office, Office of the Attorney General, and the legislature.

Republican Nominee

Lt. Governor Tim Griffin first served as the 24th representative of Arkansas's Second Congressional District from 2011-2015 and was later elected the lieutenant governor of Arkansas on November 4, 2014, currently finishing out his second four-year term. Griffin had originally announced intentions to run for governor, however in early 2021 he opted to run for the Office of Attorney General clearing the way for the eventual Republican gubernatorial nominee, Huckabee Sanders. Early in 2021, Griffin [announced](#) the change for running for Attorney General, claiming he wanted to support Arkansas in a "different capacity".

Throughout his campaign, Griffin has focused on what he is [calling](#) a "parolee problem", highlighting crimes committed by those on parole status. He has connected this program to an example of a "revolving-door criminal justice system."

He emphasized his [endorsements](#) by Arkansas Right to Life and the National Rifle Association of American (NRA), touting his conservative values.

He has raised over [\\$2.2 million](#) for the 2022 election cycle, which surpassed all previous records for Attorney General races in Arkansas.
