

ALABAMA

Voters in Alabama will elect a Governor, Lt. Governor, and Attorney General this cycle. All 105 Alabama State House seats will be on the ballot as well as all 35 Senate seats. Republicans are expected to maintain control of the governorship, the OAG, and the legislature.

Attorney General

Attorney General Steve Marshall (R) was appointed to his office by Governor Robert Bentley (R) after Luther Strange (R) resigned to serve in the U.S. Senate. In 2018, Marshall defeated Joseph Siegelman (D) to win election to a full term. Before his appointment as attorney general, Marshall worked as a district attorney, a local prosecutor, in private practice, and as a legal analyst for the state house.

One of Marshall's priorities since taking the office of attorney general has been immigration. He was one of nine attorneys general, plus Idaho Governor Butch Otter (R), who [threatened](#) the Trump administration with litigation if he did not terminate the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program. He now [accuses](#) the Biden administration of dismantling U.S. borders and disregarding its duty to enforce immigration laws.

Marshall promises to prosecute corruption and hold public officials accountable, citing his [prosecution](#) of Lanett Mayor Kyle McCoy's use of his position for personal gain.

He [expresses](#) dedication to addressing violent crime in Alabama and pledges to resist any efforts to defund the police.

Marshall [guarantees](#) that he will protect Alabama from overreach by the federal government. He calls the actions of the Biden administration a "full court-press to reshape America into a socialist dystopia."
