Illinois voters will elect a governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, secretary of state, comptroller, and state treasurer in 2026. Thirty-nine (39) of the 59 seats in the Illinois State Senate and all 118 seats in the Illinois House of Representatives are up for election. Democrats currently hold a strong advantage in both the executive and legislative branches and are expected to maintain control of state government following the 2026 elections.

Robert Fioretti is a veteran attorney and public servant whose career has been centered on civil rights and government accountability. He draws on more than three decades of legal experience, including service as a Special Assistant Attorney General, Special Assistant State's Attorney, and Chicago alderman. Fioretti [argues](#) that Illinois needs an attorney general focused on **protecting consumers, combating corruption, defending civil rights**, and improving **public safety** rather than serving political insiders.

Fioretti's campaign platform is focused on restoring public trust in government, increasing transparency, and ensuring that the legal system works fairly for families, businesses, and communities across Illinois.

Among the accomplishments of his career, Fioretti lists helping secure the exoneration of a wrongfully convicted man, pursuing reforms to Illinois adoption laws, and supporting economic development, education initiatives, and neighborhood investment during his time on the Chicago City Council.

Trivia: Before entering elected office, Fioretti supervised more than 500 civil rights cases and personally tried over 100 cases that helped shape state and federal law while serving in the City of Chicago's Law Department under Mayor Harold Washington.
