

## IDAHO

Idaho residents will head to the polls in November to elect a governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, and treasurer. All 35 state senate and all 70 state house seats are also on the ballot. Republicans are expected to maintain control of the attorney general's office and the state legislature.

### Republican Nominee

### Attorney General Raúl Labrador

First elected in 2022, Raúl Labrador is running for a second term in office. Prior to his time as attorney general, he served in Idaho Congressional District 1 from 2011 to 2019 where he co-founded the House Freedom Caucus. He also served in the Idaho House of Representatives from 2006 to 2010.

During his time as attorney general, Labrador has prioritized defending conservative values before the court. This includes fighting against federal overreach during the Biden administration and upholding Trump's executive orders before the courts. He recently joined 23 other states in an amicus brief supporting Trump's executive order on birthright citizenship.

Protecting **children's online safety** is a key priority for Labrador. Throughout his first term, he reformed the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, addressing a backlog facing the task force. In October 2023, he joined a lawsuit along with 32 other states against Meta claiming that the companies' business practices violate the federal Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA).

Labrador is also a staunch supporter of **school choice** and parental rights over their child's education. During his time in office, he successfully defended Idaho's school choice tax credit.

He is also supportive of **greater parental rights in medical decisions**, helping to pass a bill in 2024 that allows a parent to sue a healthcare provider that treats a minor without parental consent.

Labrador is also a **vocal critic of open primaries and rank choice voting**. In 2024, he sued the Idahoans for Open Primaries ballot measure that sought to put the question of implementing a nonpartisan open primary in the state on the November 2026 ballot. He stated the measure violated the state constitution by addressing more than one subject and deceptively collecting signatures by not explaining the full effect of the measure.
