Voters in Alabama will select a new governor this year following term-limited Governor Kay Ivey's (R) exit from office. Voters will also choose a lieutenant governor, attorney general, and treasurer. All 105 house seats will be on the ballot as well as all 35 senate seats. Republicans are expected to maintain control of the executive offices and legislature.

Rosilyn Houston

Rosilyn Houston ran unopposed in the Democratic primary for Alabama Treasurer. A seasoned senior executive and board director, she brings more than 30 years of experience across the financial services, nonprofit, and corporate sectors. At BBVA US (now PNC), she held senior leadership roles that included direct profit-and-loss responsibility for a \$12 billion balance sheet spanning retail, wealth, and commercial banking.

Houston's [campaign](#) is centered on **financial responsibility, transparency, and expanding economic opportunity** for all Alabamians. She is emphasizing her financial sector experience, which includes engaging with regulators, risk committees, and global management teams, as well as advising on governance, compensation, and regulatory compliance across U.S. and EU banking environments. She has also highlighted her record leading mission-driven organizations and **advancing ESG initiatives**.

Most recently, Houston served 16 months as Chair and Interim CEO of the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute, a nationally recognized institution focused on social justice and education. She holds a B.A. and an M.A. in Management from the University of Redlands, and has completed executive and leadership education programs at Babson College, the Wharton School, and Pepperdine University.

In November, Houston will face incumbent Treasurer Young Boozer (R), a well-established officeholder who served as state treasurer from 2011 to 2019 before being reappointed to the role in 2021. She has a steep hill to climb in a state where Republicans have dominated statewide elections by wide margins.

Trivia: Houston is widely recognized for her trailblazing career as the highest-ranking female and first person of color to serve in the C-Suite and Management Committees of two global banking firms.
