

ALABAMA

Voters in Alabama will select a new governor this year following term-limited Governor Kay Ivey's (R) exit from office. Voters will also choose a lieutenant governor, attorney general, and treasurer. All 105 house seats will be on the ballot as well as all 35 senate seats. Republicans are expected to maintain control of the executive offices and legislature.

Treasurer Young Boozer

Alabama Treasurer Young Boozer (R) is running for reelection after assuming the office in October 2021. He was appointed to his current term in October 2021 by Governor Kay Ivey (R), following the resignation of his predecessor, John McMillan (R). He previously served as the state treasurer from 2011 to 2019. Before entering public service, he spent nearly five decades in banking, finance, and investments, with professional experience in New York, Los Angeles, Houston, and Montgomery. After retiring from banking in 2007, he served as Deputy State Finance Director under Governor Bob Riley (R).

Boozer's reelection campaign centers on his record in office, pointing to accomplishments that include launching the Alabama ABLE Savings Plan, restructuring the Alabama Prepaid Affordable College Tuition (PACT) Program, establishing a needs-based college scholarship program, and helping pass Amendment 856 to strengthen distributions from the Alabama Trust Fund. The campaign has also highlighted the return of \$45 million through the Unclaimed Property program and a 34 percent growth in the Alabama Trust Fund.

Boozer has further touted his leadership of the state's statewide efficiency initiative, noting that the Treasurer's Office has drawn no funding from Alabama's General Fund since approximately 2013. He has also pointed to a reduction in office staff, from 46 employees to 25, achieved through natural attrition and managed retirements.

At the national level, Boozer is an active member of the National Association of State Treasurers (NAST), where he chairs the Banking and Cash Management Committee, and serves on the Governance Committee of the College Savings Plans Network.
